We can use this time to pray, and reflect, and talk with one another about how we want to be church on the other side of this remodel.

One of the goals of the remodel is to let more actual light into our physical space - to create a building as welcoming as the people who worship here! This summer as we enjoy the beautiful Oregon sunshine - as we soak up the light - let's use this time of change to pray about how we can let our light shine. Let's pray together in earnest, asking for God's Spirit to be blowing in and through not only the building, but each of our hearts. Let's pray that our church will be filled with light and warmth, and that we will all be opened in new ways to sharing God's love with our neighbors.

The Beggar—A Parable

See that one sitting up there? It's a beggar. Sits all day begging God in silence. Begging bowl? Oh, they have a begging bowl alright, but it is

inside. The whole thing is going on inside, like a little miniature tableau. An inner figure dressed in a simple robe, sitting cross legged on a shelf of rock and holding an empty bowl.

Why does this beggar sit this way? His life experience has taught him that he owns nothing and God is in everything. There was a time when he thought some things belonged to him. But a thief, a forgetting, rust, breaking, and losses of every kind finally showed him that he really had the secure possession of nothing, not even his sanity or his life.

How does the beggar know that God is in everything? If God is not all powerful, then she is no longer God, but only a storybook character. If she is all powerful, she must be present everywhere. And if she is present everywhere, then she must be in everything, every thought, experience, object and person. The beggar holds an empty bowl. This shows the nothing that he is, and it stands ready to receive whatever God places into it. The common saying is "what's on my plate." But this bowl expands to hold whatever is placed there. God is constantly placing people, problems, feelings, and thoughts into the beggar's bowl. Whatever is in mind or environment may go into the bowl. At times a clear request for action comes, if so, the action comes with it. The beggar receives whatever shows up in his bowl. How could he not? When he first became a beggar, he thought there would be lots to do. But he discovered that there was not. Whatever was needed from him rose up from of his own unfathomable depths. Thoughts and words simply arose, actions bubbled up. He had only to keep his own ideas out the bowl and allow what arose to happen. It was as if God were living through him, and he was just clothing for the divine.

God was everything and he was nothing. But what a blessed nothing he was.
What a blessed nothing each of us is, with our empty bowls inside, waiting for God.

July and August Coin Offering

The July/August coin offering is dedicated to Friends of Trees. While this is a new program for us, they have been in service since 1989. Friends of Trees was founded by Portland, OR resident Richard Seidman in 1989. He was inspired by a national Global ReLeaf program and wanted to create an organization that helped the environment and brought people together through the act of planting trees in Portland neighborhoods and natural areas. Friends of Trees is a nationally recognized, regional leader in improving the urban tree canopy and restoring sensitive natural areas in SW Washington and Western Oregon. They do this through programs involving thousands of volunteers.

Let me highlight a couple of these programs. One such program is the Green Space Program: Restoring Natural Areas – From the edge of the Columbia Gorge to the farmlands of Washington County and up and down the Willamette Valley, the Green Space Program restores natural areas, increases habitat, improves watershed health, and plants trees in large quantities (about 1,000 – 2,000 native trees and shrubs per planting!). When mature, these trees will create significant improvements to our region's air and water quality.

Another program, the Neighborhood Trees Program, assists neighbors green up their streets. Friends of Trees will organize the event, deliver the trees, dig the holes, and make it affordable for all homeowners – all for \$35.00 each tree and plus a scholarship program if costs will be a barrier. And Friends of Trees plant in the Eugene/Springfield area, too. So, this summer, as we are considering Creation Care and God-Sightings, please keep in mind the Coin Offering dedicated to Friends of Trees. Help us to continue to be good stewards of God's gifts to us in this beautiful world He gave us to live in.

We thank you for your continued generosity and supporting the Coin Offerings and other

Special Offerings during the year. Remember, if we all give a little, it adds up to a lot.
